Matthew Dyktynski is an Australian actor and comedian, graduating from Australia's National Institute of Dramatic Art in 1992. Television Dyktynski has played lead roles on television series Shock Jock and Raw FM, and has appeared on The Man from Snowy River, Stingers, Blue Heelers, Water Rats, Halifax f.p., All Saints, The Secret Life of Us, House Husbands and Offspring. Film Dyktynski's movie credits include Love and Other Catastrophes (1996), Japanese Story (2003) and Wil (2006), in which he played the title role. Comedian As a comedian, Dyktynski has toured the United Kingdom, Europe and Australia. He spent several years living in London, performing as a regular on the stand-up comedy circuit. He has also performed at the Edinburgh Festival and Melbourne International Comedy Festival as well as a sold-out season at London's Soho Theatre. Radio & voiceover work Dyktynski has undertaken voiceover and narration work, including campaigns for Digital Radio Plus, Kelloggs and McDonalds. Professor Baldassar leads a research group in the School of Arts and Humanities at ECU, the Social Ageing (SAGE) Futures Lab. Her team is leading research in social care across the life-course, contributing social science perspectives and methodologies to the creative and caring professions. This approach is targeted at the development of a social care research agenda for the aged care sector to facilitate collaborative communities of care that extend people's support networks at every age. Loretta is also leading the TRACS Migration Research Network at ECU to support an active program of national and international collaborations. This ECU TRACS Migration Research Network will co-host the Annual Migration Update Conference (launched in 2015), as well as be the Australian university Partner on two international research projects: (i) UK Sustainable Care Project (2017-21), which has just won further ESRC funding to establish a Centre for Care (2022-27); and (ii) The Decentering Migration Knowledge project, which brings together four research entities in Canada, India, China and Australia, to create new knowledge about migration scholars from the Global South and North.

Susanna Iuliano



Dr Susanna Iuliano is a historian specialising in Australian multicultural and community histories. She has published several community histories relating to the history of Italian migrants in Western Australia including: *Blessing of the Fleet: A History of Fremantle's Festa* (2018); *Fremantle's Italians* (2011) and *Vite Italiane: Italian Lives in Western Australia* (2010) which won the WA Premier's Book Award for history in 2010. She has worked as a researcher and policy officer in migration and heritage related fields for Federal and State government agencies, including the Department of Immigration and the Australian Human Rights Commission. From 2013-2018, she worked as the Battye Historian at the State Library of Western Australia helping to collect and promote Western Australian history through a variety of specialist projects. In more recent years, she has worked in the local studies collecting sector as a qualified librarian developing, managing and sharing local histories for the City

of Vincent. Susanna currently works with the City of Perth where she has just co-ordinated the successful Lotterywest Boorloo Heritage Festival.

Lesa is a children's author with a Ukrainian historical and ethnic focus. Baba's Chooks series began in 2021 resulting in a Silver Medal for the first publication. The books are in the process of being translated into Ukrainian for wider distribution.

As a self-employed writer and researcher, I specialized in the Ukrainian Holodomor/Genocide of 1932-1933, publishing books and articles on this topic in Australia. I have over many years of experience in this field, combining my passion for Ukrainian history, education, and information science skills. I have a Doctorate in Arts History from the University of Notre Dame Australia, a master's degree and Graduate Diplomas in both Educational Administration and Librarianship from Curtin University.

In addition to my writing and research work, I also present workshops at the Australian College of Administration, mentor students and professionals in the information learning skills development and problem solving. The invasion of Ukraine by Russia has developed fundraising activities and close involvement with the Displaced Ukrainians who arrived in Western Australia. I have maintained my involvement with Holodomor commemoration events in WA. As a result of involvement with the Honorary Consul for Sweden I became a recipient of the Swede of the Year award 2006 for services in facilitating the visit of the Swedish royal couple to Perth.

Nonja is an anthropologist, historian and museum curator whose focus is transnational migration (forced and voluntary) and resettlement in Australia, and the sustainable digital preservation of immigrants' cultural heritage. She has a special interest in Dutch connections with Australia (maritime, military, migration and mercantile) since 1606, and Dutch connections with the South-East Asian Region (slavery) since 1595. She is initiator/innovator, researcher, and curator of 25 permanent and travelling exhibitions that have been displayed in the GLAMS (galleries, libraries, archives and museums) in Australia, Indonesia, South Africa, and the Netherlands. She is currently involved in academic, community-based, visual, and bilateral research and events in all these areas in Australia and internationally.
